

PERMANENT CANBERRA - BARTON

The first cottages erected near the Power House in 1921-1922 were known as the Power House Cottages. Today the sites of the cottages have been replaced by flats in the suburb of Barton. These cottages, along with those erected at Civic Centre and the Brickworks, were built for construction workers and were based on the Lithgow style houses. They were erected in Section 26 by day labour working for the Work & Railways Department.

The first of the three cottages built in Gosse Street for the Shift Engineerⁱ working at the Power House. These three were soon followed by another seven and by 29 March 1923 another eleven had been constructed to complete the full architectural complex. The styles ranged from Bs to Es.ⁱⁱ The latter was the larger of the cottage plans. These cottages were similar to those constructed at Blandfordia in 1923 and were finished in white stucco. The cottages at Civic Centre and the Brickyards were red brick.

The cost of construction of a three bedroom cottage was £1,000 and £800 for a two bedroom.ⁱⁱⁱ This cost excluded sewerage and before the sewer system was ready in 1927 these cottages like those at Civic and Brickworks, were connected to a septic system which was designed to merge into the permanent sewerage system.^{iv} Water and electricity were connected to the cottages.

A number of documents in the National Australian Archives document the poor quality of finish in the houses and thoughtless design of the laundry facilities. One letter dated 16 June 1924 voiced the concerns of the ladies residing in a number of these cottages:

We wish to draw your attention to the way in which the wash houses are exposed to the weather and we think something ought to be done in closing them in. On the wet day the rain beats right into the tubs.. Signed: Mrs Field, Mrs Boyd, Mrs Douglas, Mr C Fitzpatrick, Mrs A Murray, Mrs E Pitcher, Mrs Lucas, Mrs Gerrard, Mrs Crowe, Mrs Brown, Mrs C Traynor, Mrs McCorkindale, A Grandfield, LE Shannon.^v

Another letter dated 26 June 1925 from the residents of the Power House Cottages, Eastlake Cottages [Kingston] and the Causeway indicated that they were annoyed at not being included in a conference on *AMUSEMENTS*. The residents intended to send a deputation to the authorities with their complaint. The deputation was to consist of J McRae Dunn and PC Douglas [Percy Douglas was the Fire Chief]. The petition was signed by J Pand, JH Hays, Wm J Mitchell, AK Murray, A Alder, P Jolly, WJ Traynor, A Templeton, E Gipps, CCD Fitzpatrick, Donald F Fraser, JF Kingston, D McCorkindale [foreman of the Joiners' Shop and player of the bagpipes at the Burns Club], Geo Ross, WJ Fraser, J Field, W McNamee, HH Martin, P Murdon, PL Corkhill, JA Cameron, T Hulley, Clyde Finlay [medical practitioner - first to take up practice in Canberra], J Robbins, C May, J McRae Dunn, PC Douglas, Trevillian, RS Shannon, W Adamson, George L Daniel, Stanley K Peak, ? Pitcher.^{vi}

Further requests for improvements continued to be made. For example 23 March 1925 Thos H Trevillian wrote on behalf of the Progress Association asking for supply of a garbage bin with lid for each house; water tap for front garden where none supplied; sheds or garages to be provided with concrete floors - one house had a garage with a sand floor which made it difficult to drive the car in and out of the garage; raising of footpath in front the cottage occupied by Mr Pitcher to the cottage occupied by Mr Gerrard [Post Office] because water lodged there after rain; electric light to be installed front of cottage occupied by Mr Murray and block opposite the old Eastlake Quarters [Engineers' Mess] to be set aside to be used as a recreation ground.^{vii}

A document dated 4 March 1921 by John Sulman referred to the reserve in front of cottages on which today the Greek Orthodox Church stands that was used for tennis courts and playground for the children living in the Power House Cottages. John Sulman wrote: *My idea is that the reserve will form a centre for sport and recreation and that possibly a small hall or club would eventually take the place of the small church now on the site.* [The church was St Paul's Anglican Church - small timber building] *The Mess House [Engineers Mess] is only intended to be left for the present and will of course be removed.*^{viii}

St Paul's CofE was removed by 16 April 1930 [sic 1920?] and the site built upon with houses. The structure was moved to a site at the rear of Blocks 28 and 31 Section 26 where it occupied a corner portion of the recreation area which comprised the Children's Playground and the tennis court.

Another document notes that S Mitchell of No 1 had moved into the house originally occupied by R Snaddon who was the Supervising Engineer of the Power House - finished his term 30 October 1922. Mr Mitchell had lived at No 9. A list of tenants made about a year than the above adds changes to tenancies and new tenants.

Jack O'Sullivan moved to Blandfordia to a house in Ducane Street. In the early 1990s it still stood. Herbert Daniel, Mess Caterer No 1 Labourers Camp requested a move from a Civic Centre Cottage to a Power House Cottage because of the distance he had to travel to work. At that time No 1 Camp was at Eastlake. When the camp moved in May 1924 to Capital Hill, Westlake, he moved into a Westlake Cottage in *The Gap*.

Percy Douglas - the Fire Chief - had a telephone installed in his cottage. He was either the first or the second to have a telephone in his home.

There were many people who applied for a Power House Cottage. Their numbers give an indication of the shortage of good accommodation for construction workers in the territory.

The Queanbeyan Age 13 May 1921: *CANBERRA - Is she going in real earnest? The answer is emphatically, Yes? Why? Because the matter is in the hands of three men who, when they put their hands to the plough, never look back. These three are William Morris Hughes, Alexander Poynton and Austin Chapman...The building of some 40 nice brick cottages is well in hand at civic Centre, Brickworks and Power House. Civic Centre is on the opposite side of the road to the old Canberra Post Office on the way to Yass. The old road to Acton is somewhat like a maze. One has to dodge new fences which enclose areas about to be planted...*

The Queanbeyan Age 1 February 1924: *MOLONGLO CAMP - From our correspondent. An epidemic of sandy blight is as present visiting the settlement and is seriously affecting the school attendance. Adults as well as children are equally affected. There are also several cases of diphtheria. The infant daughter of Mr and Mrs D Lynch died shortly after admittance to the Queanbeyan Hospital on Sunday last owing to this disease... The population of the Camp as divulged last census was 630. A single men' mess to accommodate 90 men is to be installed shortly, and a start has been made with the caretaker's new quarters as the old quarters will be required for the mess. In addition from 13 to 20 families are expected as soon as tenements are available for occupation...Several of the families will soon be transferred to the Power House settlement as cottages there are completed and ready for occupation. Notwithstanding the fairly high rentals, there is keen competition for these cottages.*

The Canberra Times 21 June 1927: An article entitled *HOTEL LICENSES IN QUEANBEYAN DISTRICT - RENEWALS GRANTED* includes the name of Herbert Daniel, *Chinnery, Lake George Hotel, Bungendore*. It may or may not refer to Herbert Daniel Mess Caterer No 1 Labourers Camp who left his job in 1927. Herbert Daniel was Mess Caterer at No 1 Labourers Camp from 1921/22 until his retirement in 1927.

This suburb of Barton was near the Power House and site of the 1921/22 brick cottages usually referred to as Power House cottages. On the reserve in front of the Power House was the first St Paul's Church of England Church. Laurie Fitzharding in his book *St John's Canberra. Commemorating 100 Years of Church Life in Canberra* has the following to say about the church - *In August 1914 a galvanised iron mission hall, St Paul's Kingston [later Barton] was erected by parish subscriptions to serve the workmen camped by the power-house. For some years this hall was used also by other denominations. Later when the Commission erected the Causeway Hall, St Paul's was used mainly for Sunday School purposes. Regular evening services were commenced in 1929, and a regular 9 am celebration in the following year. In 1933 was commenced the 10 am children; service, which became a happy feature of Kingston worship...*



Brassey House was built in Barton in 1927. It was built on the wrong block and back to front. Information about the Hostel is in the Section on Hotels and Houses. Nearby was Telopea Park School opened in September 1923, was the first permanent school built in the FCT.

The Canberra Times 24 September 1935: Mr Charles Hector McFadyen has been prominently identified with public affairs in Canberra since his transfer to Canberra in 1927. Mr McFadyen is a prominent figure in the Australian Natives' Association and the Canberra branch of the ALP of which he was president for four years. In 19231 he was selected as one of the two ALP candidates for the Advisory Council and was narrowly defeated. He has been a member of the Public Service (Canberra) Welfare Committee for several years and was for two years president. Mr McFadyen has been keenly interested in hospital affairs and was prominent in the discussions during 1930 and 1931 of a hospital scheme for Canberra. On the formation of the Hospital Advisory Committee Mr McFadyen was one of the two members nominated by the Advisory Council.

The Canberra Times 8 September 1943: Quartel-Yeend. St Andrew's Presbyterian Church Canberra was crowded with friends at the marriage on August 8 of Beryl Ellen only daughter of Mr and Mrs HL Yeend of Griffith Canberra to Sgt Hendrik Jan (Harry) Quartel of the Royal NEI Airforce, younger son of Mr and Mrs HJ Quartel, The Hague Holland. The ceremony was performed by the Rev Hector Harrison and a large Dutch flag was draped from the pulpit...The bridesmaid were Miss Beryl Tetax of Canberra and Miss Joan Hodgson of Sydney... Sgt-Pilot Frank Yeend RAAF was best man while Geoffrey Yeend was groomsman...

The Canberra Times 3 December 1947: YEEND-PARR. St John's church was the scene of pretty wedding on Saturday when Lorna Margaret elder daughter of Mr and Mrs FL Parr of Arthur Circle Forrest and Frank Edward elder son of Mr and Mrs HL Yeend of Durville Crescent Griffith were married. The Ven Archdeacon CS Robertson (who officiated at the marriage of the bride's parents) was celebrant...She [the bride] was attended by Miss Yvonne Turner and Miss Joan Parker (cousin of the bride)...Little Dorothy Parr (sister of the bride) was the flower girl...The bridegroom was attended by Mr Jack Burns and Mr Geoff Yeend...

The Canberra Times 13 May 1953: Life Membership of RSL Awarded to Mr HL Yeend. The ACT President of the RSS and AILA, Mr HK Joyce said last night, 'It is with great pleasure that I have to announce that the ACT Branch executive at its meeting on Monday unanimously approved of an application by Barton sub-branch that one of its members, Mr Herbert John Yeend should received the award of life membership of the RSL. The award has been made for outstanding service to the League and ex-servicemen generally over a great number of years.

Mr Yeend has been a member of the RSL since 1919 and joined the Barton sub-branch on its formation in 1928. He was president of the sub-branch on its formation in 1928. He was president of the sub-branch from 1939-43 after serving as vice-president in 1937-38. He worked during the war years as a trustee of the Lady Gowrie Service Hut, and will long be remembered as vice-president of the ACT branch in 1944-45.

He has served the Barton sub-branch in many capacities from 1930-43 and has been a member of the Lady Gowrie Hut Committee from 1946 to the present day. The Certificate of Life Membership will be presented to him on an appropriate occasion in the near future. Mr Joyce added that this was the fifth life membership granted in the ACT since the inception of the branch in 1926.

The Canberra Times 1 July 1941: INDUSTRIAL BOARD - ELECTIONS IN CANBERRA. The election of members and deputies to the newly constituted Industrial Board for the ACT was held yesterday and resulted in the return of Mr D Lamond, electrical fitter, as the representative of specified unions and Mr L O'Neill for unspecified unions with Mr JH Jenkins secretary of Carpenters and Joiners, and Mr AE Gardiner as deputies. Three nominations were received for the skilled union representation on the Board, Messrs DH Brian, D Lamond and JF Muir. The first preference votes were: Brian 59, Lamond 106 and Muir 45. Muir's second preferences were allotted giving Brian a total of 73 and Lamond 137.

The nominations for deputy for the skilled unions were Messrs AE Helson, JH Jenkins, R Robson and L Rogers. The allocations of first preference votes was: Helson 45, Jenkins 82, Robson 16 and Rogers 67. Robson and Rogers were excluded and the final figures were: Jenkins 114, Rogers 96.

For representation of non-skilled unions the nominations were GA Findlay and L O'Neill, the voting being Findlay 272 and O'Neill 383. For the position of deputy of the non-skilled unions the voting was Gardiner 383 and MF McDonald 269.

The Canberra Times 18 August 1928: NATIONAL RULES - CLUB JOTTINGS - EASTLAKE - Eastlake has beaten Queanbeyan twice this season, and feels equal to obtaining Victory for the third time to-day. The Canberra Times 14 July 1930: HOCKEY. At York Park on Saturday in bitterly cold weather Ainslie East easily accounted for a weakened Canberra Grammar School team by 12-3, Bird (7), Whitehill (8), Moir and Marshall scoring for the winners. McColl (2) and Evans netted for the losers. The Ainslie forward line, now settled owing to the return of the Forestry School players is working extremely well. In the second match Kingston Maroons Playing well but scarcely up to form beat Ainslie West 7-0. The scores are deceptive as Ainslie held its own well but was unable to complete many scoring movements largely owing to the excellent defence of the Kingston goalie, Davison. Morton (2), Welch (3), Hicks (2) were Kingston's scorers and with Crapp, Arthur and Davidson were its best players. Ainslie was best served by Littlewood at centre half, Jennings, Avery and Hewitt.

Hall forfeited to RMC Cadets. During the weekend visits were received from the Goulburn Gladiators and Murrumburrah eleven. Kingston met the former and after a close and exciting tussle, won 5-4. Hicks (2), Arthur (2) and Morton netting for the winners. Kingston displayed splendid form but felt the absence of Crapp. Hicks and Welch played superb hockey and were well supported by Morton, Arthur, Kenna and Orford.

Ainslie accounted for Murrumburrah 4-1. Bird (2), Whitehill and Marshall being the winner's goal shooters and walker scoring the winner's goalie who quite nunplussed the attack and by the number of times the Ainslie forwards were penalized for being offside when in strong scoring positions owing to the tactics of the Murrumburra backs who kept well up field whenever they were able. It was not uncommon when Ainslie was talking a free hit to see all the players standing at the minimum distance from the striker, the visiting defence coming up and forcing them to. Neil and Walker shone out for Murrumburrah while McGregor, Whitehill, Bird, Jennings, Pike, Littlewood, Fizelle and Doggrell all played excellently for the local side.

The accomplished their efforts to please the audience.

Each item was well received but those present seemed to enjoy the duets most. Perhaps this was due to the success of the first item following the opening chorus, coming under that heading and causing much merriment. It was given by Messrs Reeve and Worrall and the last stanza evoked spontaneous applause:-

A number of deaths of people living near the Power House prior to the 1928 electoral roll are recorded in Jean Salisbury's book, *St John's Churchyard*. They are:

Annie Catherine Rose, second child of Edward and Dorothy Rose. The couple had seven children and lived near the Power House. They later moved to Sydney. Annie Catherine was 2 years and 2 months when she died 26 May, 1920. Following her death 22 December 1989 aged 93 years the ashes of Dorothy were interred with her daughter.

Norma Louise Fitzpatrick died 28 September 1926. She was 15 months of age. She was the daughter of Cecil Clive Fitzpatrick a clerk employed at the Power House and Edith Ida Fitzpatrick.

Morgan, Emma Elizabeth, wife of Arthur Charles Morgan, labourer employed at the Power House died on 13 November, 1915 aged 28 years. She was mother of two daughters.

Ebsworth, Rebecca Jane daughter of Robert and Rebecca (Fenton) Travers was born in 1872. She married John Ebsworth at St Andrew's Braidwood and the couple had three children. John was employed at the Power House. Rebecca died 15 December 1948.

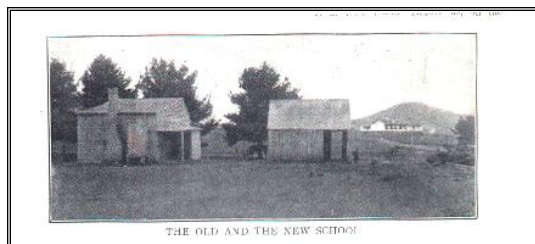
Dunn, James McRae, Son of James Hector McRae Dunn and Mary Fulton Dunn of the Power House. The family lived in one of the cottages behind the Power House. James was one day old when he died on 1st October, 1920.

Dunn, Mary Helen daughter of James Hector McRae Dunn and Mary Fulton Dunn died 10 March 1929 aged 10 months.

Boyd, Mary Wife of Russell Boyd, labourer who was employed at the Power House. Mary died 25 March, 1917 aged 59 years. Mary and Russell had eight children. The couple married in 1882. Their first child was born at Narrandera.

McEwan, Henry Son of David and Margaret McEwen. He was born at Hobart and worked as a plasterer and lived near the Power House at the time of his death 1 December, 1914 aged 59.

The Canberra Times 13 September 1927: *...Mr Hyland of the Treasury accompanied by Mrs Hyland and family arrived in Canberra yesterday. Their future residence is at Block 6 of Section 28 Telopea Park.*

The Canberra Times 10 July 1928: Clerical Association - FORMATION OF CANBERRA BRANCH. *To mark the inauguration of the Federal Capital Territory branch of the Commonwealth Public Service Clerical Association a smoke concert was held last night in the Acton Hall of which more than 100 officers were present, and the new executive officers of the branch were installed. Mr WG Hay (president of the NSW branch) who presided offered his congratulations to the members upon the formation of the branch in the capital and promised the co-operation of the State branch with that of Canberra. He referred to the association's aim to procure the whole Saturday holiday as one which had found favour in municipal and private business. He also stressed the necessity for procuring a better type of representation on the council of the association.*

A strenuous programme of work for the future was predicted by the general secretary (Mr AV Langker). After referring to the past achievements of the association which was regarded by the Public Service Board as an institution of undoubted necessity, he offered some suggestions for the guidance of members in matters for review by the executive council.

As a motto for the new branch, 'Service and Sacrifice,' was proposed by the general president (Mr AS laws). No government, he said, could disregard the work of the public servants. He announced the result of the poll for office bearers as follows:- President, Mr CH McFadyen (Customs Department); vice-present, Mr JR Davis (Audit Department); secretary, Mr FA Meers (Customs Department); treasurer, Mr WM Adamson (Federal Capital Commission).

Councillors: Messrs W Duffy and C(?) Greene (Customs Department), J Brack (Home and Territories Department), DE Allbright (Federal Capital Commission), H Hyland and J Flewelling (Treasury Department), Trustees: Messrs GA Crease (FC Commission), HA Berry (Customs Department); Auditors Messrs Waite and Westwood (Audit Department), Messrs F McKenna, F O'Rourke, D Mulcahy, H Scriven, AR Peters and C Murden contributed to the musical programme.

The Canberra Times 18 December 1934: Mr HD Hyland of the Finance Branch, Treasury, was farewelled by officers of the department on Friday last. Messrs HJ Sheehan (secretary) and J Brophy (accountant) spoke appreciatively of the sterling personal qualities of Mr Hyland and the capacity displayed by him in various branches of the department with which he had been associated for some seventeen years...Mr Hyland will commence duty with the Trade and Customs Department on his return from recreation leave.

Eulogistic reference to Mr Tandy's 11 years of service at Canberra with the Commonwealth Police Force were made by the President of the Association (Mr W Fellowes) whose remarks were supported by the Vice-President (Mr Hush), the hon secretary (Mr IC Perriman), and the treasurer (Mr L Ivey) as well as by other members present. Mr Tandy returned thanks for the handsome present and said that the good fellowship shown by his colleagues during his 11 years of service would always remain a priceless memory. He said that he would probably be classed as an 'old buffer', but as far as his health was concerned he 'could have carried on in the force for a few years more.' During his residence in Canberra said Mr Tandy, he had made so many friends that he intended to reside here as long as he was spared.

The Canberra Times 20 October 1928: ANNUAL CONVENT BALL. The first annual Convent Ball will take place at the Albert Hall on Tuesday October 30. Supper is being provided by the ladies of the Parish and there will be dancing from 8.30pm to 1.30am. Mrs TB Simonds and Mrs WJ Tandy are the joint honorary secretaries.

The Canberra Times 22 November 1933: OLD ACTON COURTS RESTORED BY POLICE ASSOCIATION. At a meeting of the FCT Police Association at the Canberra Court House on Monday night Mr WJ Tandy was elected to the vacant position of Vice President of the Association. The renovation of the old Acton Tennis Court has been undertaken and arrangements are being made for the formation of a Police Tennis Club. The first match will probably be a challenge meeting between the Police Force and the Canberra Fire Brigade. The tennis court was constructed more than 21 years ago by the first Government employees engaged in surveying the site of the Federal Capital.
